SOUTH AFRICA UPDATE #2

According to S A Stamp News (Vol 1 No 1 July/August 1996) the proposed AIDS awareness booklet that was originally rumored for release in April of 1996 has been put on hold indefinitely. We quote: "Owing to the fact no consensus has yet been reached with the appropriate authorities on the sensitive question of language, slogan or stamp design, the AIDS awareness booklet scheduled for July, has now been dropped from the year's program."

As part of the AIDS ON STAMPS Project's *Phase II* (see **TARGET 2000** page 6) we have included South Africa in our first mailing of this project and hope we may be of some influence in convincing them to include an AIDS related booklet in their 1997 stamp program.

SURFING THE NET: WE ARE THERE!


(TENTATIVE LAUNCH: W.A.D. DECEMBER 01, 1996)

That opportunity has arrived and we are in the midst of setting up a "home page" to be up and running (in part) by World AIDS Day, December 01, 1996!

TARGET 2000 KICKS OFF PHASE II OF PROJECT

Now that our successful lobbying efforts for a Canadian AIDS stamp are behind us and we are enjoying some of the spinoffs from them we are frequently asked....what's next? Well, "what's next" has already been put into motion and we refer to it as PHASE II of the Project!

In the beginning of October we started Phase II by sending out the first of a series of "letters of proposal" to various Postal Administrations worldwide that have yet to acknowledge the subject of AIDS in their stamp programs. Over the next few months we will be batching to several countries so that eventually we will have contacted at least 60 more countries.

Our long term goal (by World AIDS Day, December 01, 2000) is to have been influential in convincing another 60 countries to recognize AIDS. This would double the number of countries who have done so by that time. We realize the next four years will go by quickly. However we will keep our readers updated on the progress of this Phase II of the Project.

A STAMP IS BORN°

Episode Three: MEDIA MANIA
GETTING THE MESSAGE OUT

It is a general given that when it comes to news in the philatelic world, it has to be of exceptional or controversial proportions to attract much, if any, attention in the regular "worldly" press. Here in the Western World the issuance of AIDS stamps (more recently USA - 1993 and Canada - 1996) gained more press solely because of the nature of the topic represented - AIDS was timely, topical, and "in our face.," so could not go easily unnoticed.

Although from the early period of my lobbying efforts and the first public displays of already accumulated AIDS related philatelic materials, getting attention by local press or media was like trying to pull teeth. Media Releases and phone calls failed to stir up much attention.

Then, as time went on and it was realized that I was not going to just "go away" with my efforts, some started to take notice and actually wanted to interview me about the project and find out what kind of response I was getting from politicians, Canada Post, and AIDS groups.

However, from day one, the Philatelic Press was quite interested in following the project and actually wanted to be kept informed as things progressed. Canadian Stamp News on more then one occasion gave the project front page coverage! Club Newsletters also carried updates over the four year period. It wasn't until a favorable decision was made by Canada Post that most regular media showed any signs of interest.

As most AIDS Support Groups across the country have their own local newsletter to their membership I attempted to keep them updated on a regular basis. However, very few chose to even mention anything about a Canadian AIDS stamp.

When all was said and done and the actual release date of May 08, 1996 was confirmed I was quite shocked to learn that the official "launch" of the stamp was being scheduled with a media blitz out of Toronto - even though the lobbyist, the designer, the artist, and the city where the Conference the stamp was commemorating, were all in Vancouver!

Yet, even more frustrating was the fact that the Conference organizers had made all the plans for the launch out of Toronto without ever a mention of myself. Their original plans included taking the artist and two Conference representatives to Toronto for the ceremonies.

Once I had confirmed their plans through a copy I had acquired I put together plans myself (using their plan as an almost identical blueprint) for a launch here in Vancouver just one or two days before the Toronto event. In all my visits and conversations with the Conference office around this time, not a mention to me of their plans!

However, when their plans went to the person who had the final word on it, and they noticed the obvious omission of any mention or participation to include myself, the plans were quickly changed to include me in the party going to the Toronto launch.

Needless to say, it was not meant to be after all. As things turned out, I was hospitalized and had open heart surgery on May 01 so was unable to attend any launch functions whatsoever. Yet, two days before this I wrote a brief message from my hospital bed and requested that it be read (or at least mentioned) at the launch in Toronto, in my absence. This apparently was done.

Locally, press, radio, and film now were all wanting interviews. These included CBC Radio, three local and regional television stations, and local daily press. What a difference a day makes!

At this point I would just like to express a special thanks to a couple of close friends here in Vancouver who were always there with an open ear especially through the stranger moments and a big thank you to Jean Ann in Madison, Wisconsin; my counterpart for the USA AIDS stamp - she had gone through it all before me and offered immeasurable support that only she could do.


TOPICAL CATEGORIZING

In my personal exhibit "AIDS: From Diagnosis To Death" I have created a special section entitled "The Endless Toll" in which I use stamps that feature persons both living and passed on from HIV/AIDS. When I first introduced this section in public exhibit last year, many questioned why? I stressed that it is important that we must never forget those who have gone before or, those who have accepted the challenge to live

with HIV/AIDS.

Included in this section are: Magic Johnson, Greg Louganis, Arthur Ashe, Cazuza, Rock Hudson, Liberace, Freddie Mercury, Rudolph Nureyez, and Glauber Rocha. Will Scott include these under the topic of AIDS as well?



CANADA 1996 COMMEMORATIVE COLLECTION


