

TANZANIA'S

Prevention, Awareness Campaign

This set of four stamps and one minature sheet arrived this month without any advance notice. We do not yet have an official issue date but will pass it on as soon as we do. Each of the stamps carries an individual message about AIDS prevention and awareness. It would appear the set is sponsored by a condom manufacturer (Salama). The messages are brief and to the point: 140/- "Condom protects against AIDS"; 310/- "Caution! You may contract AIDS"; 370/- "Control of AIDS is our responsibility"; 410/- "Care and support AIDS orphans"; 500/- "Condom protects against AIDS"; World AIDS Day.



AIPEX 2000 UPDATE

Since our last update we have received a couple of responses, followups from countries we have already contacted. Our next phase of this project will include an additional contact with all those countries we have already been in touch with plus an additional number of countries/postal administrations. We will be stressing the importance of receiving concrete information as our target date is for December 01, (World AIDS Day) 2000. We will also be in touch with the organizers of the 12th International Conference on AIDS to be held in Geneva in 1998 in hopes of them stressing the possibility of other countries recognizing AIDS on their stamps in some form or other.

We have been informed from Singapore that they regret that they are unable to accommodate the topic of AIDS within the indicated timeframe but will consider the topic as a potential theme for future issues beyond the next 2 - 3 years programme.

Costa Rica has responded with an unfavourable decision at this particular point in time.

However, as I mentioned earlier, I will continue to contact all countries from time to time regardless of the timeframe of Dec. 01, 2000.

NATIONAL AIDS AWARENESS WEEK SEPT. 29 thru OCT. 05, 1997.

Two major annual events will be taking place here in Canada in the endeavours of creating a heightened awareness of HIV/AIDS as it relates to Canadians:

On September 28 most major cities from coast to coast will be participating in a National AIDS Walk to raise funding for the AIDS community at local levels. This walk has become the one major fundraising event of the year for most HIV/AIDS organizations.

During the week of 29 September to 05 October a variety of events will be put on in hundreds of cities, towns, and communities as a means of creating awareness, education, and support through the theme The Changing Face of AIDS. This focus was decided upon by the Canadian AIDS Society's Board of Directors for the 1997/1998 campaign.

We have consistently believed that every vehicle possible must be used to create HIV/AIDS awareness at every level and, in particular, that using the postage stamp as such a vehicle holds much potential, past and future, in contributing to this task. That is why we continue our efforts here at the AIDS ON STAMPS Project on a global scale. Our motto for lobbying countries worldwide to consider acknowledging AIDS on their postage stamps is simply put: "Expressing a Universal Approach to a Global Concern."

POLL RESULTS FINALLY IN

The Canadian Stamp News reader's poll has been tabulated for the Canadian 1996 stamp issues and the Canadian AIDS stamp did not fare well at all. Percentage of votes received for "best" was 0%, "worst" was 9%, and "favourite" was 3% CSN reported that a total of '300-or-so' votes were received.

ISSUE DATE CORRECTION

As you will see illustrated on the <u>Cover Story</u> on page 6, we have received information that updates the release date of the Kenya AIDS set formerly reported (and catalogued) as 31 October 1991. The official Kenya Posts & Telecommunications Corporation <u>Technical Details</u> would confirm a later release date of 31 January 1992.

ISSUES UPDATE A TO Z

Apart from the Tanzania stamp issue found on the cover of this newsletter, we have not heard of any new AIDS related stamp issues. Just a reminder that the Turkish Republic Of Northern Cyprus is still scheduled to include in its December 1997 "Anniversaries" issue one stamp pertaining to AIDS. No doubt we may see something from some other country in conjunction with World AIDS Day: - if not a stamp, hopefully a cancel or so! We have received the following cancels since the last newsletter.









HIV is the virus that attacks the body's natural defences causing the immune system to become severely damaged, leading to the individual becoming sick, AIOS can develop in the individual some time after becoming infected with the HIV virus, usually leading to death from any one of a number of diseases.

The red ribbon has been edopted to symbolise HIV and AIDS awareness. To a great many people the red ribbon has become a symbol of hope, solidarity and remembrance and is recognised around the world.


